Embossed Scraps Background Tutorial You can't go wrong with this technique as long as you use complementary colored cardstock.

Supplies:

- Dark Chalk Ink Pad
- White or Light Colored Cardstock
- Several Cardstock Scraps in Different Colors
- Several Embossing Folders
- Embossing Machine (not pictured)
- Long, mostly solid Image Stamp
- Adhesive




Step One:

Place each cardstock scrap into a different embossing folder. Emboss and remove from folders.



Step One Continued



Step Two:

Cut the scraps to different widths, from ½" to 1 ¼", and varying lengths from 1 3/4" to 2 1/2".




Step Four:

Place the image over the scraps to determine the best placement. Make any adjustments on size or strip location as desired.






Step Three: Place a line of scraps down the cardstock, staggering the sizes for visual interest.



Step Five:

Lift the scraps one at a time to apply adhesive and adhere to cardstock.



Step Six:

Ink the stamp with chalk ink. Chalk ink is used because it is easily pressed into and around the texture on the scraps.




Step Seven: Allow the ink to dry and finish the card as desired.
