

## Desolv'd Images Tutorial

*National Geographic magazines work great with this technique. This is best done outside or in a well ventilated room. Filmed by Ann Clack.*

### Finished Card:

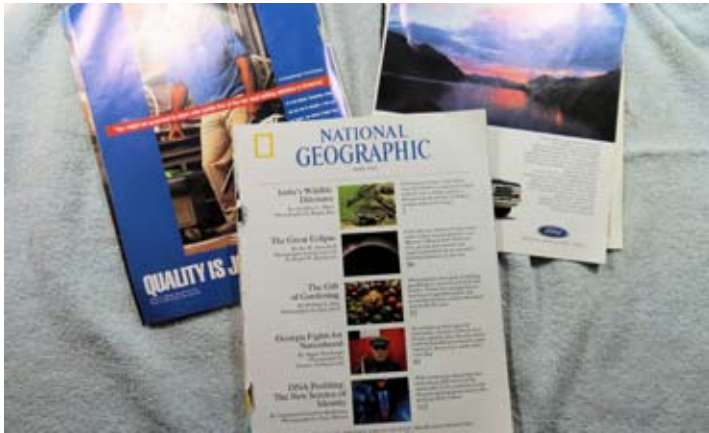
### Supplies:

- CitraSolv Cleaner
- Rubber Gloves
- National Geographic Magazine
- Old Towel
- Craft Sheet
- Newspaper



### Step One:

Punch a small hole in the top of the CitraSolv Bottle.



### Step Three:

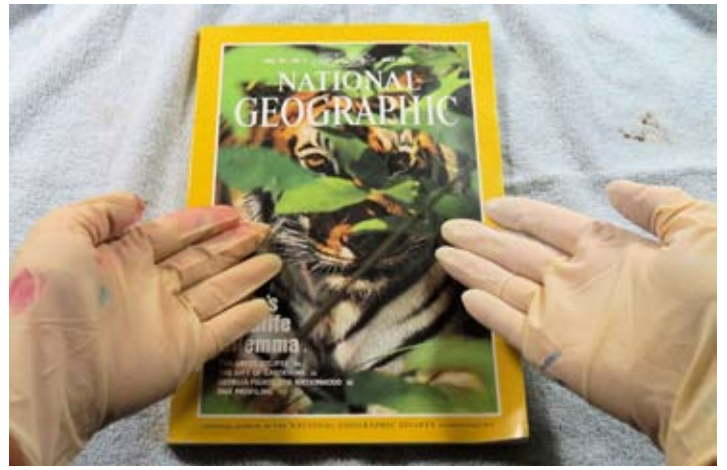
Front and back of NG has lots of ads. Tear off those pages and discard. You can keep some of the pages that have great color and insert with the good pages.



### Step Five:

Check the pages. If the ink is moving, it is time to start tearing out the pages you like. Place them on newspapers to dry or on the grass outside. Opening pages partially and closing slightly, then opening again will result in beautiful patterns.

### Step Two:

In a well ventilated room or outside on a still day, lay towel over craft mat. Put on gloves to keep ink off your hands. If you get ink on hands, clean off with CitraSolv.



### Step Four:

Open the magazine to your first page. Lightly sprinkle CitraSolv over page. Does not have to be covered. Turn the page and repeat. Continue until you have completed all pages. Close magazine and let sit about 5 minutes.



### Step Six:

Pages with text and not many pictures can be used as well. After the ink starts to dissolve, use your rubber gloved finger to move it around.





## Step Seven:

Reclose the magazine on the page from step six and reopen to create great patterns.



## Step Nine:

Finish as desired.



## Step Eight:

To help you 'find' the beautiful areas of your papers, hand cut a quick mat and move over your papers to find the best areas.

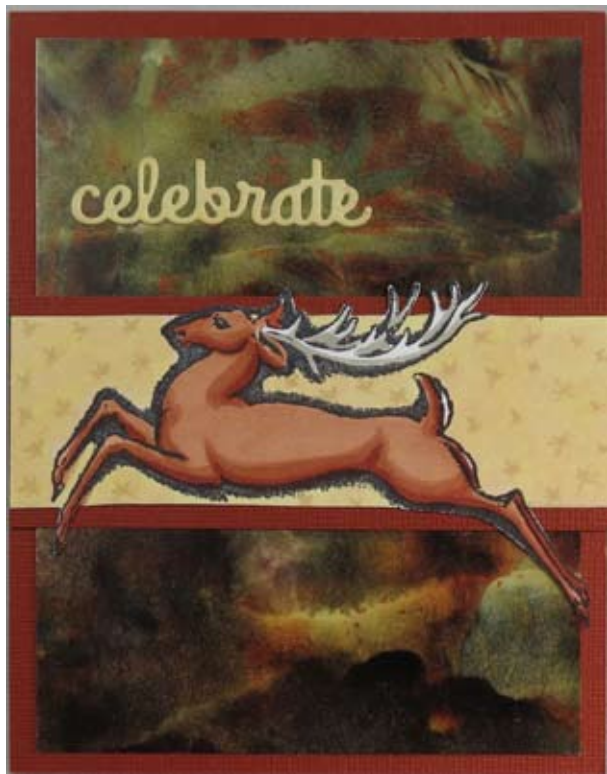

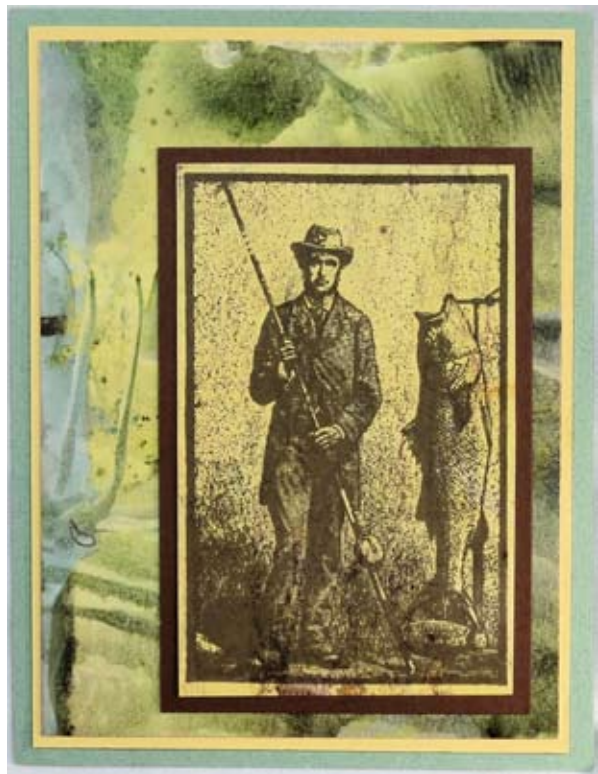
